El Cuyo FAQs & Insider Tips

What Should I Pack for El Cuyo?

- Light breathable clothing — it's tropical all year round
- Swimsuits & sandals — you'll live in them
- Mosquito repellent — especially important during dusk
- Sunscreen & hat — the sun can be intense even in winter
- Cash in pesos — many places are cash-only

When Is the Best Time to Visit?

- November to April — cooler, drier weather with sunshine
- May to October — hotter, with occasional tropical rain and a chance to see turtle nesting or baby flamingos
- Low season = fewer people, more peace

Are There Power Outages?

Yes, occasional power outages do happen — especially during storms or high-demand seasons. Most are short-lived (30-120 minutes), but it's wise to:

- Charge devices when you can
- Bring a portable charger or power bank
- Download offline entertainment just in case

It's all part of the small-town charm — a reminder to slow down and unplug.

Is There Good Internet in El Cuyo?

Yes, but it varies. Many Airbnb homes and cafes offer decent WiFi, but don't expect high-speed fiber. Great for remote work with a view, as long as you're not streaming or video editing.

Is There a Supermarket in El Cuyo?

There is no large supermarket. Instead, you'll find:

- Small local tiendas (corner stores) with basics: water, eggs, chips, fruit
- Produce trucks that pass through town
- Mini markets with dry goods, snacks, and drinks

If you have dietary restrictions or special needs, bring essentials with you from a bigger city like Cancún or Tizimin.

Is the Water Safe to Drink?

No — always drink bottled or filtered water.

Are There ATMs or Do I Need Cash?

There's only one ATM and it is not reliable — bring cash in Mexican pesos. Some restaurants and shops accept cards, but cash is essential for taxis, markets, and tips.

What's the Vibe Like in El Cuyo?

Think: quiet, soulful, slow living. It's not for partygoers — it's for travelers who love sunsets, hammocks, and nature. Expect sandy roads, friendly locals, no resorts, and a rhythm all its own.
